Local Hero Dorothy Mulkey Honored by OC Human Relations

In the early 1960's Dorothy Mulkey faced the indignity of not being able to rent a new apartment because of racial discrimination. Rather than ignore this injustice, she took the issue to the courts to seek relief. The local courts, including the California State Supreme Court, upheld the ability of Orange County property owners to discriminate against renters and buyers. California voters had addressed this "right" when they passed Proposition 14 in 1964 which effectively nullified the Rumford Fair Housing Act. On May 29, 1967, the US Supreme Court overturned both California State Courts and lower court decisions and ruled Proposition 14 unconstitutional. Dorothy's intention was to have "what we thought everybody had a right to - a place to live where they wanted to live based upon their ability to pay." In May 2005 Dorothy Mulkey received the OC Human Relations Award.
