# It's Your Right, Exercise it! GO VOTE!

Be Educated ~ Be Informed ~ Be Safe





## You have the following Rights:

- ✓ The right to vote if you are a registered voter.
  - You are eligible to vote if you are:
    - A U.S.citizen living in California
    - At least 18 years old
    - Registered where you currently live
    - Not currently in state or federal prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony.
    - Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.
- The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list.
  - You will vote using a provisional ballot.
  - Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.

- ✓ The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.
- ✓ The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.
- ✓ The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake, if you have not already cast your ballot.
  - You can:
    - Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot.
    - Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an election's office or at your polling place.
    - Vote using a provisional ballot.
- ✓ The right to get help casting your ballot from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.
- ✓ The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.
- ▼ The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.
- ✓ The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process.
  - If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer.
  - If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.
- The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an election official or the Secretary of State's office.

# WHERE IS MY BALLOT?

The California Secretary of State is now offering voters a new way to track and receive notifications on the status of their vote-by-mail ballot. The "Where's My Ballot?" tool lets voters know where their ballot is, and its status, every step of the way.

- Sign up at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov. When you sign up for "Where's My Ballot?" you will receive automatic updates when your county elections office:
  - Mails your ballot.
  - Receives your ballot.
  - Counts your ballot.
  - Or if there are any issues with your ballot.
- Voters who sign up at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov can choose to receive automatic updates by:
  - Email
  - Text Message (SMS)
  - Voice Call
